PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

If you attended Kol Nidre then you heard me give this speech. I thought it was appropriate to reiterate some of my thoughts and so ask for your indulgence. We begin a new year I need new ideas for activities to sustain us. Covid has been a challenge that is plaguing my strength and creativity for sustaining safe and near normal community activities. Our recent Sukkot Social was well attended and enjoyable. Our Tea & Talk Tuesdays—and field trips have to resume soon or we will lose momentum. Someone needs to take a turn to host. Call me please with your preferred date and what you want to do for us.

There are few things in life that are free

How many times have you thought you had the right tool to fix the assembly or repair job, just to find out it needed a special type of screwdriver head or obscure wrench, not included with the kit, and only available on line, and on back order, or special type of part that can only be special ordered. Aggravation—all free!

So you get a call or email that you have won a special prize, if only you call or log on to a specific site or number to claim it. Not suspecting anything, and being trustful, because it really sounds legitimate, you respond. You find out the hard way that it is a scam and you already clicked send or gave out your valuable identification number to your personal information. That was free, but what you now have is a mess to reestablish yourself securely and cancel your plastic life and links. That does not come cheaply or free. It may not cost money to make the corrections, but in aggravation and affect to your nerves—it is a high price to pay to regain your identity.

Over the many years of working in my garden I have purchased many perennials, shrubs, expensive plants, spending an accumulated fortune, only to find the proliferation of 'free' plants have taken over where I planted the desired plants. So now I call it my Garden of Weedin'.

Then just as I think I have everything under control, I am that type A person, something comes along to break up the perfection and to cause more aggravation and energy. For FREE!

We have all heard of Murphy's Law. You know you have invoked Murphy's Law when things start coincidentally obstructing your progress or peace of mind. Some can chalk it up to Murphy's Law and walk away. Some interpret Murphy's Law as God's punishment for not being observant or not praying hard enough, as in the movie I recommended for Sukkot, Ushpizin. (BTW, did you watch it? What did you think?)

Peace of Mind is something we all need and want. Some of us can block out the mishaps and negatives and go on about life with absolute peace of mind because we choose to avoid controversy by not engaging in community activities that involve others or common interests. Isolating oneself and avoiding Jewish community engagement sets a poor example for being a Jew. I guess we might consider such people secular, unaffiliated Jews, rather than observant Jews. And we cannot rely on them to seek membership or engagement. But wait – how can we, and how do we, respond when they inquire, asking who is available to bury their Jewish parent or spouse, or to perform a baby naming, or to consult with a Rabbi about troubling personal issues? Those are services which a strong Jewish community provides, but without support from the people, we lack the manpower and financial resources to staff those services -- and frankly, without people and money we can accomplish nothing.

However, these questions don't seem to be what the Torah, Rabbis and Sages have to teach. We Jews descend from ancestors who were strongly community minded and who cared for and about all other Jews – who reached past themselves and their immediate families to embrace their fellow Jews.

The Peace of Mind—which comes from knowing that a Jewish place and people who maintain it will be there for you when you need Halachic or personal comfort and knowledge about practices of our faith that you otherwise may have grown numb and away from. That is never free. Somebody always has to provide those Jewish community services, and the burden of providing manpower and funding always falls on the shoulders of people like you and me. And because we really care about our Jewishness, we make a sincere effort to carry that burden.

At this time of the year in our Synagogue and with many members of our Jewish community, I want to remind you that the burden of helping you attain a Jewish Peace of Mind comes not just once a year, but everyday throughout the year. It comes from individuals in our community supporting the organized center of Jewish practices to spread out and influence others to join for every day not just when the need is most felt. We hope we will be able to be here and to respond when needed, but that will be possible only with more commitment from everyone, to be more active and involved to help the survival of our Synagogue. Whether you lean towards Orthodoxy, Conservative or Reform, Reconstructionist or other divisions of Judaism, you are still a Jew and you should belong with us and engage in the Jewish community, not only for yourself, but to maintain a presence for others.

Not only do we need more human resources, we are always in need of more financial support. We are operating on the fumes of our accounting balances, like needing gas, and need to fill up and give us more energy to ride through the journey from Rosh Hashanah 5782 to Rosh Hashanah 5783. In the Hebrew Bible people were asked to tithe a tenth to the Temple. Can you pledge or tithe a tenth of your annual income as in Biblical times? All the mention in the Torah of people bringing support to the Temple contained an amount, one tenth, equal amounts from everyone. Can you spare a few more dollars this year than last? If you are able, won't you increase your pledge from last year?

We have this Kol Nidre Appeal every year to project and assure additional income above the dues that you pledge to contribute. Our dues do not compare to other synagogues in that we have extremely low levels in order to make your membership more important than plying you for money when you join. However, there are many more expenses than our dues can support just to run the physical plant and to support a part time Rabbi. We do not pay administrators or even at this time, a part time secretary. We are bare boned in all we do, and rely on your additional generosity as well as some benefactors who have more generously endowed special projects and installations.

When you receive your Kol Nidre Pledge card, please turn down the tab that most generously contributes your highest amount you will be comfortable expending. We are mailing the cards if not picked up this evening. Please be generous. (*Stu Handler has already mailed your card, please respond immediately with your generosity.*)
