RABBI'S COLUMN:

As Jews we are accustomed to being called the "People of the Book." Actually, this term comes from Islam which used it to characterize the Jews because they had received and written down an earlier (before the Koran) revelation from God. The Book referred to is the Five Books of Moses.

Jews love to read, and many of us participate in Jewish-themed book clubs. For Greater Philadelphia Jews, the book chosen this year for "One Book One Jewish Community" is the Noa Tishby Israel book that I had suggested we all read.



For Jews everywhere in the world, the book of this month is the Haggadah. The word *Haggadah* means "telling," and that is what we are meant to do—tell the story of our escape from slavery in Egypt. And especially, tell it to our children.

The Haggadah text is based on the seder service prescribed by the Mishnah (BT: *Pesachim* 10). Many scholars believe the seder was modeled on the Greek symposium, a banquet which included discussion, and conversation, and food. The particular foods and narrative relating to our story— eating of the *matzah*, *marror*, drinking four cups, and recital of the *Exodus*—were integrated into the seder banquet.

The Haggadah does not repeat the account in Exodus which stars Moses and God and tells the story chronologically. Instead, the Haggadah is a collection of prayers, *Midrashic* comments, and psalms. And Moses is absent.

Like my great uncle Moe, of blessed memory, we can read every word at high speed to get through it. Or we can take our time. After all, we do not have the Egyptians hot in pursuit. And if, indeed, the seder format is based on the Greek symposium, you can bet there was reclining, discussion, and intermissions throughout the evening while many courses were consumed. Before the actual seder we can develop our own reader's guide to our book-of-the-month. There's a lot of information available.

One question I am taking up in my next Moses class is why the Haggadah doesn't just tell the story straight, following the Book of Exodus. What is the reason for its form? Maybe, to quote the Canadian communications theorist Marshall McLuan, the medium (in this case, the format) is the message. I leave it to you to figure out. Or you can come to the Moses class on Sunday, April 21.

PRACTICAL PASSOVER PREPARATION 2024

April 18th and 19th before Shabbat kosher the kitchen for Pesach. Prepare to change your dishes, silverware, pots, pans, etc. Glass dishes and crystal can be used because they do not need to be *kashered* for Pesach. Just wash them before using.

Paper plates, plastic utensils, and disposable aluminum cookware are often used if you do not have Pesach dishes and cookware. Be sure to have dishtowels, potholders, oven mitts, matzah (kosher for Pesach matzah), dishwashing sponges or wipes, etc., set aside for Pesach-only use.

As for *chametz* (food not to be eaten on Pesach), you can lock up your chametz and "sell" it to Chabad at https://www.chabad.org/holidays/passover/sell_chometz_cdo/jewish/Sell-Your-Chametz-Online.htm

So much of Judaism is about sanctifying time (like the Sabbath). These eight days of Pesach are very special to our Jewish identity and we should mark them as different by observing as many requirements as we can.

April 21st – Sunday

Sunday evening, do your final search for chametz. This search is a ritual search called, "b'dekat chametz" (searching for chametz). In Eastern Europe the tradition was to use a feather and conduct the search by candlelight (a flashlight is safer). The last chametz is burned on Monday morning.

Blessings before the search for chametz: "Baruch Atah, Adonai Eloheinu, Melech ha-olam, asher kid'sha-nu b' mitz-vo-tav vi'tzee-va-nu al bee-ur chametz."

"Blessed are You, Lord our God, King of the Universe, who sanctified us by commanding us to remove all the chametz."

Blessing after the search: "Kol cha-mee-rah va-cha-mee-ah d'-i-ka vir-shoo-tee, d'-la cha-mee-teih oo'd'-la va-a-ri-teih oo-d'-la ya-da-na lei, liv-teel v'-leh-heh-vei hef-keir k-'af-ra d'-a-ra."

"All chametz in my possession, which I have not seen and have not removed or of which I am unaware, is hereby nullified and ownerless as the dust of the earth."

April 22nd- Monday

If you are a first-born, it is traditional to fast until sundown. But there is a widely practiced exemption. On the principle that fasting is prohibited on a joyous occasion, Judaism allows for anyone who attends a religious feast to forego fasting. It is customary to hold a celebratory meal on the completion of study of a tractate of Talmud, called a *siyyum* (conclusion). So, after the morning service on Erev Pesach, the rabbis initiated the practice of studying a portion of a Talmud tractate after morning services or talking about a Talmudic tractate they recently finished studying. All the firstborn and others are invited to be present for this siyyum which is followed by refreshments. This mitzvah meal negates the fast.

So, study (or listen to Torah), feast, and then you don't have to fast.

Burn all remaining chametz in the morning. At that time recite the passage declaring all chametz in your possession to be null and void.

Kol cha-mee-rah va-cha-mee-ah d'-i-ka vir-shoo-tee, da- cha-mee-teih ood'-la cham-mee-teih, d'-va-a-ri-teih ood'-la va-a-ri-teih, liv-teel v'-leh-heh-vei hef-keir k'-af-ra d'-a-ra.

These take a few weeks to arrive. The cost is \$450.00. If you wish, Steve will arrange with you to conduct an unveiling and pay homage to your relative at a subsequent Friday evening service. You may also choose to host the oneg in conjunction with the unveiling. In case you are unaware of the Yahrzeit list within the bulletin, if there is a plaque in memory of a relative, the board (**Bd**) and row (**R**) number has been listed for your convenience. **No pl** means there is no plaque.
