# RABBI'S COLUMN:

Leviticus 19:18 tells us, “*V’ahavta l’rayacha kamocho,*” (“You shall love your neighbor as yourself”). It is one of the most important mitzvot for Jews and, generally, good advice for all. We need more love in today’s world where there seems to be a great deal of hate, especially hate directed at Jews.

However, it’s February and this month we think of romantic love because of Valentine’s Day on February 14th.



Traditionally, love for Jews centers on marriage. The Talmud tells us of two days on which matches were made. One was the 15th day of the Hebrew month of Av, Tu b’Av; the other, surprisingly, Yom Kippur. Young women of Jerusalem would wear white gowns and dance in the vineyards chanting: “Young man, lift up your eyes and see who you would choose for yourself.” (Ta’anit 4:8)

Chabad reminds us that Judaism, while it knows of love and sang of love— consider the Song of Songs—doesn’t have a Romeo and Juliet story. “Judaism is suspicious of powerful drives that cannot be disciplined, regarding ‘blind’ decisions as non-ethical. It considers ecstasy temporary and undependable in terms of long commitment unless it can be transformed into everyday acts of love.”

In a previous Rabbi’s Column, I explained that according to Jewish law it is fine to celebrate this holiday because it does have secular value, one can explain the ritual (love) apart from its non-Jewish holiday origins; its idolatrous origins have disappeared and its associated activities are consistent with Jewish tradition. So, send flowers, buy chocolates, show your appreciation to a loved one.

Although the Beatles tell us “All you need is love,” love is not all we need. In any relationship, romantic or otherwise, we need understanding, tolerance, respect, and compassion. Without those qualities there is no *shalom bayit* (peace in the home) and certainly no peace in our world.

## *Eishet Chayil*, Remembering ANNIE PARKS

On Friday night before Shabbat dinner, it is a Jewish custom to pay tribute to the worthy woman of the house, with someone reciting, *Eishet Chayil*. The text, from the Book of Proverbs 31, praises her generosity, her work, her strength, her wisdom, and her kindness. It says that she is never idle. And wherever people gather, her deeds speak to her praise.

On this Shabbat, I stand to praise an *Eishet Chayil* of our house, Congregation Beth Sholom. Although many of you may not know it, the lovingly expressed letters you received in the last few years from our Congregation to honor your birthdays, losses, achievements, and other special occasions, came from the heart and pen of Annie Parks.

Annie loved this synagogue and its people. And, as a professional interior decorator, she had a highly developed sense of esthetics, which she put into action for Beth Sholom

You probably don't know that she is the one who cleaned the ark in the chapel and regilded its letters. You did not know because she did not want to take the credit. She helped me decorate the synagogue for our Purim celebrations. She redecorated my office, including re-painting it with an accent wall. And when you admired it, I could not tell you that it was her idea and her work because she refused to accept any acknowledgment or thanks. She preferred Anonymous to Annie for all her good works.

Annie was a force of nature, sometimes very insistent about what she thought was in our best interest or her own best interest, although we might not have agreed. She could not help herself, for she wanted everyone to have what she believed was their best possible experience and environment. When she came to my house in Swarthmore, she insisted I remove the large hallway mirror on the second-floor landing and replace it with family photos. And she was ready to pick the photos, have them framed, and hang them artistically for me. She bugged me about it, kept checking on the project's progress, but, hard as it was to say "no" to Annie, I still have not done it. Fortunately, she had a good sense of humor.

Going shopping with her once at Dover Mall, she picked out items both personal and household for me that she believed would make my life more beautiful and fun. She bought nothing for herself. It cost me a small fortune. But she was joyous.

And she knew what she wanted for herself—a house, a garden, her dog Harley, her friends, and family. At the end of her life, she wanted to remain in that home. Despite a long history of adverse conditions, she worked very hard to make a good life for herself. While quite a few of us stepped up to help her, she always made her own decisions.

I have never known anyone with such a life force. She escaped death so many times it is hard to believe it finally bested her.

She was strong, she was kind, and she was never idle. And so, I am glad to have the opportunity to praise this *Eishet Chayil* who, ironically, would not like to be so acknowledged at all. Sorry, Annie, but everyone should know who you were. We will remember you. Shalom.

## A Message from the Vice President for Religious Education

“Lifelong” Jewish learning has been a core value of Judaism since Ezra mandated the public reading of the Torah. *Batei midrash* (houses of study) were established so adults could use their “leisure time” to fulfill the mitzvah of *Talmud Torah* (learning of Torah).

In America, adult learning became a central programmatic component of both synagogues and Jewish centers. In 1940, the United Synagogue of America established the National Academy for Adult Jewish Studies to “encourage and promote adult learning both formal and informal in the synagogue and in the general Jewish community.” (Keller, 2000). This passage is a segment of an article discussing the nature of Adult Jewish Education particularly in America. The author suggests that Jews in America are going through a sort of renaissance and more and more adult Jews are delving deeper into the traditions and practices, liturgy, and mysticisms of Judaism. It is interesting that as we adjust ourselves to a new year, many of us are perhaps also looking to adjust ourselves as Jews.

Maybe now is the time to take a class in Hebrew, or start putting on tefillin again, or brush up on Jewish history, or maybe just share our Jewish story with our children and grandchildren. With that in mind, if you are not doing so already, I invite you to take thirty minutes, or so, out of each week to read the parashot for the month of February. However, if you are able, join the Parasha reading group on Wednesdays at 6pm on the synagogue zoom.

This month we will read the parashot of: *Yitro*, *Mishpatim*, *Terumah*, and *Tetzaveh* along with their accompanying *haftorot*. I like to think of the Torah as the crucible where Judaism was smelted and so it is an important component of our Jewishness. Thus, every now and again it is refreshing and revitalizing to bathe ourselves in its warmth.
