RABBI'S COLUMN:

Why is Thanksgiving my favorite secular holiday? Because it's a very Jewish holiday.

The Pilgrims identified themselves with the biblical Israelites. They viewed the New World as the New Canaan. They likened themselves to God's chosen people as they headed for their Promised Land. In the Hebrew Bible they read God's words to the Israelites: "When you have gathered in the bounties of the land, you shall observe a festival of the land" (Lev. 23-29); and "When you have eaten your fill, give thanks to the Lord your God for the good land which He has given you" (Deut.8:10). They read the Book of Psalms, filled with expressions of thanksgiving, like Psalm 100: "Enter into His gates with thanksgiving, and into His courts with praise; give thanks to Him and bless His Name." And so, in the autumn of 1621, less than one year after their arrival, they celebrated their first Thanksgiving out of gratitude, even though they had encountered bad weather, hard work, and inadequate food in this promising land.



Many Jewish holidays are based on thankfulness. On Sukkot, our agricultural forbearers expressed thanksgiving for the fall harvest. On Pesach we continue to express thanks for having escaped Egyptian bondage. On Shavuot, we express thanks for the wheat harvest; the first fruits were brought to the Temple as thanksgiving offerings.

Many Jews begin each day reciting "Modeh Ani" at home, giving thanks for awakening to another morning of life.

In Beth Sholom, we should all be grateful that we have survived another year and that it has generally been a good one in our community.

Beth Sholom is a wonderful community. I love the way you participate in services; I love the way you ask questions; I love the way you laugh; I love the way you care for one another.

I am grateful to be your rabbi.

Kol Nidre Appeal
October 11, 2024

Shana Tova Beth Sholom Family!

I remember clearly standing before you last year on Kol Nidre as the new President of Beth Sholom. I stood before you, feeling a mix of excitement and trepidation. I shared that although I never considered myself to be the most learned or observant Jew in our Synagogue, I was indeed a thankful Jew who felt strong connections to our Beth Sholom family.

I shared how nearly 30 years ago, the people of Beth Sholom welcomed me, my husband Garth and 4-year-old son Louis, and soon embraced Alex born just a year later. I spoke of how Beth Sholom was always there for us, providing education to my children from K'ton-ton through Bar Mitzvah. Sitting Shiva at my home upon the loss of my mother and father and helping me consistently through my own illness and recovery. I spoke of dancing at Bar Mitzvahs, celebrating holidays and of sharing the joy of just being part of a Jewish Community.

I spoke of the importance of a Jewish community. Of being able to share all the joys as well as the sorrows of life, from our uniquely Jewish perspective. Sadly, just a few weeks after my address, we found ourselves facing a terrible tragedy, and once again needing to come together in solidarity, prayer, support and hope.

I stand before you now, one year after my first Yom Kippur appeal with a bit more experience and little more confidence. One year later, my belief in the importance of our Beth Sholom family and its crucial place in our community has become even stronger than ever.

This past year we have prayed, studied, sang and danced together. We have celebrated birthdays, anniversaries, and engagements. We have joyfully welcomed new friends into

our Congregation and have sadly said farewell to others. We laughed, we kvetched, we ate. We prayed **for** those in need of healing and **with** those in mourning. We smiled proudly for those called to the Torah for the first time. We stood with our people and prayed for peace. Together, a community, a Congregation, our Beth Sholom Family.

Now I appeal to my family. We need your support. So many of you have gotten involved this year, from reading Torah and leading services to decorating the synagogue and baking Challah. Most importantly by showing up and participating. We all know that one person can make a minyan. Please continue to take part in Temple life in the best way for you.

We also need your financial support. Our Congregation dues are very modest and do not cover all of our operating expenses. In fact, dues have not been raised in over 15 years. We are committed to keeping dues low so that finances do not impact on someone's ability to join. We strive to keep membership affordable for all. That said, we ask you at this time to willingly contribute what you can to keep our doors open. Please be as generous as you can be. Every donation helps. In closing, Gwen Stubbolo, who last year professed not to be the most learned or the most observant Jew in the Congregation has a confession to make. This past year, through my weekly Service participation, adult education classes and weekly Parsha readings have become a bit more learned and more observant. And best of all, inspired to learn more about my people and faith. Who would have guessed? Thank you, Beth Sholom. I welcome all of you to join me on this journey.

This year the month of November coincides with the Hebrew month of *Cheshvan*. *Cheshvan* is the 2nd month of the Hebrew calendar. Classically, name of the month is *Marchesvan*. However, “the original name of this month was not *Marchesvan*. This Babylonian name was adopted when the Jews went through the 70-year exile between the first and second temples. The original Hebrew name for the month was *Bul*, which denotes the idea of “drying up,” as the leaves begin to decay with the approach of Autumn” (Goldwag). “Cheshvan is the only month that does not have any holidays or special mitzvot. We are taught that it is “reserved” for the time of *Moshiach*, who will inaugurate the Third Temple in the month of Cheshvan. The great flood in the days of Noach began in this month, and it was a year later, also in the month of Cheshvan, that Noach left the ark.” (Chabad).

Certainly, there is a drought of Jewish holidays in this season. I think it is fitting since we have just emerged from the season of the High Holy Days with its spiritual intensity. Now is perhaps a time for calm and reflection because on the horizon with autumn and winter comes Chanukah.

On October 9th the Parasha reading group has completed its first trek through the Torah, and on October 23rd began its 2nd sojourn reading the first Parasha of *Bereshit*. In this month of November, we will continue with *Parashot Noach, Lech Lecha, Vayera, Chaye Sarah, and Toldot* and their associated *Haftorot*. Each week we read the Torah portion and have lively and thought-provoking discussions about the parsha. The Parsha reading sessions are open to all and meet on Wednesdays at 6:30pm on the synagogue zoom.

Additionally, the Torah Study group meets on the last Monday of each month at 7pm on the Synagogue zoom. The next session will convene on Monday November 25th and will be led by Steve Schwartz.

I trust you will take time to take advantage of this lull between two joyous seasons and perhaps join us in our torah study activities.

Volunteer hours will start on Oct. 7th. Our doors will open from **6:30 P.M. to 8:30 P.M. Mondays through Thursdays in the evenings only**.
